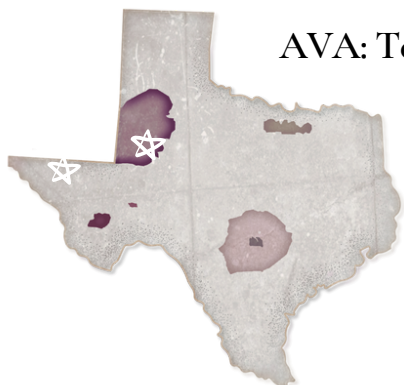
A lush, medium-bodied red wine of ripe character, perfect for someone taking their first sips of Texas wine. Layers of red fruit, black cherry, toasted oak and fresh herbs are deepened by the spice and luxury of just 15% Petit Verdot.



Pair with game meat and anything off the grill. Also mild to medium cheddar.

VARIETIES: 85% Cabernet Sauvignon, 15% Petit Verdot

AVA: Texas High Plains

COUNTY: Terry, Hudspeth

The Texas High Plains is the second largest designated grape-growing region in Texas, spanning 8 million acres, yet it is responsible for the majority of the wine grapes grown in the state. A rare set of growing conditions make this area unique. On a vast flat plain, the vineyards reach elevations of 3,000 to 4,000 feet, resulting in very balanced wines.

2023 VINTAGE: Much needed rain and mild temperatures before several weeks of long 100+ degree temperatures. Sugars stalled, but grapes were harvested at ideal pH and acidity levels with balance.

WINEMAKING: Fermented in a mix of large oak fermenter and stainless steel tank.

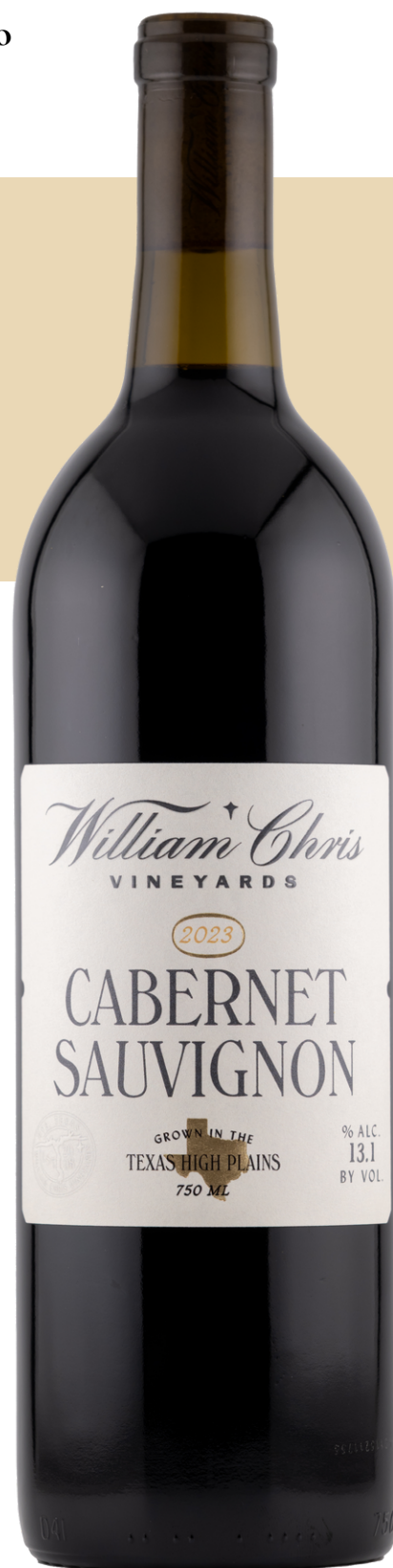
Aged in 20% new French oak barrels and 80% neutral oak barrels for 20 months.

AGE OF VINES: 12 years

SOIL TYPE: Amarillo fine sandy loam

ELEVATION: 3,000 feet on average
